Special Report Submission.

Special Report Review Process. The Accreditation Review Committee (ARC) will review Special Reports and make a recommendation to the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors will determine if the Special Report satisfactorily addresses the area(s) of non-compliance and make one of the following decisions:

- Accept the Special Report as demonstrating that the program has satisfactorily addressed the area(s) of noncompliance identified in the Annual Report.
- Reject the Special Report and require the program to submit a Plan to Correct addressing any continuing areas of noncompliance (see Plan to Correct procedure).

About Us > Accreditation

Catholic University's professional program in architecture is fully accredited by the National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB), the sole agency authorized to accredit U.S. professional degree programs in architecture.

In the United States, most registration boards require a degree from an accredited professional degree program as a prerequisite for licensure. The National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB), which is the sole agency authorized to accredit professional degree programs in architecture offered by institutions with U.S. regional accreditation, recognizes three types of degrees: the Bachelor of Architecture, the Master of Architecture, and the Doctor of Architecture. A program may be granted an eight-year term, an eight-year term with conditions, or a two-year term of continuing accreditation, or a three-year term of initial accreditation, depending on the extent of its conformance with established education standards.

Doctor of Architecture and Master of Architecture degree programs may require a non-accredited undergraduate degree in architecture for admission. However, the non-accredited degree is not, by itself, recognized as an accredited degree.

The Catholic University of America, School of Architecture and Planning offers the following NAAB-accredited degree programs:

- Master of Architecture, Two Year, Professional degree, 60 graduate credits
- Master of Architecture, Three Year, Professional degree, 111 graduate credits

The next accreditation visit for both programs is Spring 2031.

How much does it cost to attend the School of Architecture & Planning? -

University Costs: The cost of attending the Catholic University of America (CUA) varies widely depending on lifestyle and individual choice. However, we want to give you a snapshot of a typical architecture student's costs!

According to the Office of Student Financial Assistance, <u>undergraduate students living on campus can expect to pay roughly \$83,882* per year</u>, while <u>graduate students living on campus can expect to pay \$79,290* per year</u>. This is without scholarships, financial aid, or assistance.

Additional Architecture Costs:

There are a few estimated additional costs for students in the Architecture program:

- Laptop: \$1,000 \$3,000 (one-time purchase)
- Software:
 - o AutoDesk: Free Student Version
 - o Rhinoceros: \$200 (one-time purchase)
 - o SketchUp: Free Basic Version / \$55 Studio for Students (One-Year Subscription)
 - o AdobeCloud: \$20/month (\$240/year)

- Analog Supplies: \$200 (one-time purchase)
- Portable Drawing Board (24" x 36" or larger): \$150 (one-time purchase)
- Storage Trunk (with lock): \$40 (one-time purchase)
- Printing: \$3.50 to \$6.50 for large format boards, \$0.10 to \$0.39 per 8.5 x 11" sheets
- Models' Materials: \$100/semester (\$200 per year)
- 3D Printing: PLA filaments cost \$90 \$200 per model
- MetroCard for Travel: \$30/Semester
